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Charlton Agricultural Society's Standing Rules and Regulations

Members and Exhibitors are requested to pay strict attention to all rules as they will be adhered to by the Officers of the Society.

From each member taking prize money to the value of \$3.00 or over the Treasurer will deduct \$3.00 for next year's membership.

No more than one entry may be made by any one person in any one section except HORSES, CATTLE, SHEEP, GOATS, RABBITS, POULTRY, VEGETABLES, POTATOES and FLOWERS.

While the Directors will take every precaution possible to ensure the safety of articles sent to the Fair, it must be strictly understood that the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them. Any articles being accidentally insured, lost or stolen, the Directors, while giving every assistance in their power toward the recovery of the same, will not make payment or be held responsible.

ALL WORK MUST BE THAT OF THE PERSON EXHIBITING. Proof will be requested where there is a question. If the article is found not to be the work of the exhibitor, the person will be asked to remove his or her exhibits from the Fairgrounds for that year. All prize money will be forfeited.

ALL WORK MUST BE NEW AND NOT WORN UNLESS OTHERWISE SPECIFIED.

Every animal exhibited at any exhibition of the Society shall be the bona fide property of the Exhibitor one month before the entry can be made. All fruit, garden produce, roots and flowers (except arrangements) must be grown by the exhibitor. Check class rules for any exceptions.

No animal or articles exhibited shall have about it any prize or card until after the judging of the articles or animals of each class.

Any person who shall attempt to interfere with the judge while in the discharge of their duties or shall afterwards on the premises of the Society, use any contemptuous or abusive language to any judge in consequence of any award made by him or her shall forfeit their right to any premiums to which they may be otherwise entitled and shall be excluded for one year thereafter.

JUDGES ARE REQUESTED TO REPORT ANY BREACH OF THIS RULE.

EACH EXHIBITOR MUST HAVE HIS OR HER OWN MEMBERSHIP.

Any prize recommended by the Judges which is not advertised in the Prize List will not necessarily be awarded.

Should there only be one exhibit in a class or section Judges may use discretion in awarding prizes and no prize will be awarded unless the Judge considers the exhibit worthy.

Admission to the Fair Grounds: Adults \$5.00 or Weekend Pass \$8.00 each, Seniors and Students (13-18 years) \$3.00 and Children 12 years and under free.

Cars must be parked in the space provided by the Directors and may not be driven over the Fairgrounds outside the parking area.

The Society reserves the right to deduct the amount offered in Prize Money if necessary to meet any emergencies that may arise.

In several classes trophies have been added to a prize. The trophies will be presented at Award's Night. All trophies will remain the property of the Charlton Agricultural Society unless otherwise specified as a keeper trophy. Trophies are to be returned at the Fair in the following year.

Trophies will only be awarded where there are two or more entries in the class.

The Director in charge of the individual classes may advise an exhibitor to compete in the section in the opinion of the Judges, the entry properly belongs and also have the power to amend an entry at the request of an exhibitor.

Where two members of one family exhibit in any class, proof may be required that exhibits were made or cared for by the Exhibitor.

All prize money not collected by December 31 of the same year will be forfeited to the Society.

ENTRY TAGS WILL BE AVAILABLE UNTIL 11:30 A.M. ONLY ON THE DAY OF JUDGING. ALL EXHIBITS MUST BE PLACED IN THEIR SECTIONS BY 12:00 P.M. on Friday of the Fair. The exhibits must not be removed until 4:00 p.m., on Sunday of the Fair. All livestock must be on the Grounds no later than 10:00 a.m. on the day they are to be shown.

The Society will furnish guards for the duration of the Fair.

All baking must be at least 12 hours old. Entries should be shown on small trays and be placed in a freezer bag; please fasten entry tags so they do not fall off.

EXHIBITORS ARE REQUIRED TO TABULATE THEIR PRIZES AND SUBMIT THEM IMMEDIATELY TO THE SECRETARY AFTER THE FAIR.

Directors reserve the right to substitute all merchandise for cash.

Owners must be on hand to show their livestock at the time specified for their classes. Poultry and Rabbits must have entry tags for each class entered.

Members are requested to tag all entries carefully and conspicuously. This will greatly help in correctly placing the articles.

In the case of a tie for Special Prizes, the exhibitor with the most first prizes in that section will receive the prize. If there is a tie for first place, exhibitors will split the prize.

While the judging is taking place, only Judges and Directors will be allowed in the buildings.

Any horse or pony being ridden outside the Horse Show area during the show will be expelled from the Fairgrounds.

The rent paid for a concession or booth is for rent only. It does not allow workers in free of charge.

All dogs on Fairgrounds should be kept on a leash at all times.

ANY EXHIBITOR LODGING A COMPLAINT MUST DO SO IN WRITING AND DELIVER IT TO THE SECRETARY WITHIN SEVEN DAYS OF THE CLOSE OF THE FAIR. IT MUST PLAINLY STATE THE CAUSE OF THE COMPLAINT OR APPEAL AND MUST BE

ACCOMPANIED BY A DEPOSIT OF \$50.00 WHICH WILL BE FORFEITED TO THE SOCIETY IF THE PROTEST IS SUSTAINED.
ALL DECISIONS ARE FINAL.

Spray – a portion of a plant carrying a number of flowers and can show buds, buds carrying colour, green buds and leaves

ANNUAL HAND QUILTED CHAMPIONSHIP QUILT
Eligibility, Rules and Regulations

General Conditions

1. Entries must be solely made and hand quilted by the exhibitor and exhibited and judged at a local Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies (OAAS) to be eligible for this competition.
2. Entry quilts must be a minimum of 324" measured on the perimeter (smaller quilts will not be eligible to proceed to the next level of competition).
3. The winner's name and pattern name to be displayed at the Fair on a sign provided by OAAS.
4. Judging will occur at local fairs and district levels. A Provincial Grand Champion Quilt will be selected at the Annual OAAS Convention.
5. Upon making an entry into the OAAS Quilt Competition, the Exhibitor agrees to participate in any promotional activities related to the competition.
6. The winning OAAS Champion Quilt will not be eligible to compete in any future District and/or Convention OAAS competition.

Local Fair Competitions

1. Local Fair is entitled to send only the Grand Champion Quilt, (minimum 324" measured on the perimeter) judged the Best of Show of all hand quilted quilts to the District Competition. **OR** If any entry wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of ALL ELIGIBLE QUILTS at more than one Fair, the other Fairs at which this quilt was entered and won, should enter their RESERVE CHAMPION or SECOND BEST of SHOW OF ALL CLASSES quilt in the District Competition

NOTE: If an Exhibitor wins GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of ALL ELIGIBLE quilts at other than his/her own Fair, or at more than one Fair, the Exhibitor must consider the Agricultural Society nearest his/her home address as the one from which the quilt will be sent to the District meeting.

2. An Exhibitor who wins more than one Best of Show title with a different quilt at different Fairs shall be entitled to enter each winning quilt to compete at the District Competition.
3. Local Homecraft Divisions are requested to judge a GRAND CHAMPION or BEST of SHOW of all ELIGIBLE quilts. As well as RESERVE Grand Champion or SECOND Best of Show of all ELIGIBLE quilts.

The GRAND CHAMPION and the RESERVE GRAND CHAMPION are judged from all first and second prize ELIGIBLE quilts.

District Competitions

1. Judging quilts at the District Competitions will be the responsibility of each OAAS District.
2. The first place winning hand quilted quilt from the District Competition is eligible to enter the OAAS Championship Quilt Competition at their Annual Convention.

In cases where the winner of the District First Prize Quilt decides not to enter the Final Championship Competition, the Second Prize quilt winner at the District Competition will be eligible

3. The Ontario Association of Agricultural Societies will award a ribbon and prize money of \$25 for First Place, \$15 for Second and \$10 for Third to Exhibitors of winning hand quilted quilts at each District Competition.
4. All District entries must be registered on the OAAS Championship Quilt Entry Form, returned to the OAAS c/o Kathryn Lambert, by December 1st for payment of prize money. (NOTE: Late entry forms may disqualify the District Quilt entry from competition).

OAAS Championship Quilt Competition

1. Judges who officiate the Championship Quilt Competition at the Annual Convention will be appointed by the OAAS.
2. All quilts, entered in the competition must be hand quilted.
3. All quilt entries must be received for judging by the Competition Coordinator in the designated room between 7:30am to 8:30am on Friday of the Annual Convention of the OAAS.
4. The Competition Coordinator will assign a number for each entry. Entries will only be identified by this number during the judging process.
5. No Exhibitor shall be permitted to place or attach any Fair or other Exhibition identification on their quilt entry. Please remove all tags, ribbons, etc..
6. No persons other than the judges and designated officials will be permitted to enter the designated judging room until after the quilt judging, and winner has been announced.
7. Any Exhibitor or person acting on behalf of the Exhibitor who violates any of the Rules and Regulations or who interferes with the judges or the judging process, shall be disqualified and the quilt will be removed from the competition.
8. No quilt exhibit shall be removed from the display viewing area until the official closing of the viewing room and designated time of pick up.
9. The OAAS shall not be held liable for any loss occasioned by fire, theft, accident, condition of quilt, the negligence of other Exhibitors, officials or otherwise.
10. Any protests must be made to the Homecraft Committee of the OAAS in writing within 5 working days after the last day of the Convention.
11. The entry judged BEST of SHOW at the February Convention will be declared the OAAS CHAMPIONSHIP QUILT. A \$500.00 GRAND PRIZE will be awarded and the Exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt. A certificate and ribbon will also be awarded to the winner. A \$100.00 RESERVE GRAND PRIZE will be awarded and the Exhibitor will retain ownership of the quilt.
